Fire it Up, Safely

Let the grilling season begin! Start by choosing a safe area to place your grill. It should be away from your home and deck railings and never on a balcony. Give your grill a good cleaning; accumulated fats and grease are more likely to start a fire. When you light your grill, be sure to open the lid first. Once finished, turn off all burners on the gas grill and close the valve on the top of the propane tank. For charcoal, let the coals cool completely before removing them and only dispose in a metal container.
