Hot Tips: Smoke Alarms Save Lives



National Fire Prevention Week is October 5-11. This is a great time to test whether your smoke alarm will work in an emergency. Emergencies happen without warning, and a properly working smoke alarm can provide you and your family with valuable time to escape a fire.

Test your smoke alarm every month, and change the batteries at least once a year. If your alarm chirps to indicate a low battery, be sure to replace your battery as soon as possible. Most smoke alarms have a 10 year working life. When it's time to replace your smoke alarm, consider one with a 10 year, non-replaceable lithium battery. That way, you won't have to remember to replace the battery on a regular basis.

Keep your smoke alarms free of dust by periodically dusting or vacuuming them per manufacturer's instructions. For the most protection, place smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside every sleeping area and on every floor including basements. Never disable your alarm or intentionally remove the battery.
